The intellectual property right and information technology are not static. They involve unceasingly, doubtless under the impulse of an intangible object which trifles with the demarcation lines between disciplines and borders.

The CUERPI centre is an attentive witness of the intellectual property openness, as the previous editions of the conference attest it such as IP/IT and Competition law (2015) or IP/IT and contract law (2012)... Internal borders to external borders, the conference of December 2, 2016, at the Museum of Grenoble will have as the principal topic "Intellectual property and information technology outside its borders".

The conference participants will analyse the circulation, the translation of the intellectual property laws in between legal systems (national, regional, international), in order to measure their permeability and their possibility of spread.

The first part is about international opening of IP/IT rights, which is illustrated by the integration of supranational rights (European harmonisation) and by the borrowing (inspiration) to foreigners systems to improve ours. The second part of the conference concentrates on showing how technical or political reasons lead IP/IT to a national fold, for example, the ownership and the protectionism surrounding international transfers of personal data"

The conference 2016 will be the occasion to accommodate prestigious academics and practitioners from six different countries. It will be bilingual (English/French) thanks to the presence of researchers in intellectual property of the University of Edinburgh (UK) and the University of Washington (Seattle-US).
